

Behold Your God: A Study in Knowing and Worshiping the One True God

Overview: This Bible study leads participants into reverent reflection on the nature, character, and revelation of the Triune God. Rooted in Scripture, it explores God's self-existence, holiness, love, justice, mercy, and more—calling us to live in worshipful awe and joyful obedience.

Lesson 1: Theology Begins with God

Focus: Understanding theology proper—the study of God Himself—and its central role in Christian faith.

Key Scriptures:

Deuteronomy 6:5 Psalm 103:1-5 Romans 11:33-36

Main Idea:

Theology is not primarily about doctrines or systems but about the living God. All of life, doctrine, and discipleship flows from rightly knowing God.

Reflection Questions:

- What comes to mind when you think about God? How has that shaped your relationship with Him?
- Why is it important that theology begins with God and not with us?
- How does Psalm 103 invite us into worshipful knowledge of God?

Prayer:

Lord, open my heart to know You—not just about You. Lead me into deeper worship as I behold Your glory and goodness. Amen.

Lesson 2: God Reveals His Name

Focus: God's self-revelation through His names in Scripture.

Key Scriptures:

Exodus 3:13–15 Isaiah 9:6 Matthew 1:23

Main Idea:

God reveals His name to show His nature and nearness. Every name is a promise and a glimpse into who He is.

Reflection Questions:

- What does it mean that God calls Himself "I AM"?
- Which name of God has comforted or strengthened you the most?
- How can studying God's names deepen your trust?

Prayer:

God, You are who You say You are—faithful and near. May I honor and trust Your name each day. Amen.

Lesson 3: God Is Infinite and Holy

Focus: Exploring God's transcendence, infinity, and holiness.

Key Scriptures:

Isaiah 6:1–5 Psalm 90:1–2 1 Peter 1:16

Main Idea:

God is set apart in majesty, eternal in nature, and wholly unlike anything else. His holiness humbles us and draws us to worship.

Reflection Questions:

- How did Isaiah respond to God's holiness? How do we?
- What does it mean that God is infinite?
- Are there ways you've made God small in your thoughts or expectations?

Prayer:

Holy God, humble me in Your presence. Cleanse my heart and renew my awe for who You truly are. Amen.

Lesson 4: God Is Just and Merciful

Focus: God's moral perfections: justice, mercy, and righteousness.

Key Scriptures:

Psalm 145:8–9 Micah 6:8 1 John 1:5

Main Idea:

God is perfectly just, yet abundantly merciful. His justice punishes sin; His mercy forgives sinners. In Christ, we behold both without contradiction.

Reflection Questions:

- Why is it essential that God is both just and merciful?
- When have you experienced His mercy personally?
- How can we reflect God's justice and mercy in our relationships?

Prayer:

Just and merciful God, thank You for loving me with both truth and grace. Help me extend the same to others. Amen.

Lesson 5: God Is Love and Aseity

Focus: God's love and self-existence (aseity): God is love, and He needs nothing outside Himself.

Key Scriptures:

Exodus 3:14 1 John 4:7-10 Acts 17:24-28

Main Idea:

God is the source of all life and love. He exists by Himself, needs nothing, and yet freely pours out His love. His love is not based on lack, but on His fullness.

Reflection Questions:

- What does it mean that God is self-existent? How does that differ from us?
- How is God's love different from human love?
- How does this truth anchor your faith in difficult seasons?

Prayer:

Self-existent, loving God, I praise You for needing nothing yet choosing to love me. May my heart rest in Your sufficiency and grace. Amen.

Lesson 6: God Is Triune — One God in Three Persons

Focus: Exploring the mystery and beauty of the Trinity.

Key Scriptures:

- Matthew 28:19
- John 14:16–17
- 2 Corinthians 13:14

Main Idea:

God is one in essence and three in person—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Trinity is not a puzzle to solve but a truth to behold and worship. We relate to God in His fullness through each person of the Godhead.

Reflection Questions:

- How does understanding God as Triune enrich your faith?
- What roles do the Father, Son, and Spirit play in your daily life?
- What difference does it make to pray in light of the Trinity?

Prayer:

Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, I worship You as one God in three persons. Thank You for drawing me into the fellowship of divine love. Help me live in light of Your unity and mystery. Amen.

Lesson 7: Living in Light of Who God Is

Focus: Responding to God's character through holy, joyful, and obedient living.

Key Scriptures:

Psalm 103 Titus 2:11–13 1 Peter 1:13–16

Main Idea:

Right knowledge of God must lead to transformed living. As we behold Him, we become more like Him—walking in worship, holiness, and hope.

Reflection Questions:

- What attribute of God has most impacted you through this study?
- What specific way is God calling you to live differently in light of who He is?
- How can you help others grow in their knowledge of God?

Prayer:

O God, You are worthy of my heart, obedience, and worship. Let my life reflect Your beauty and truth to the world around me. Amen.

Closing Thought:

To know God is the highest calling. To love Him is the greatest commandment. To live in light of who He is—this is the essence of the Christian life. Behold your God...and be changed.
